Introduction to Wooden Boat Building Course

Jan. 30–31, Feb. 27–28, Mar. 20–21, May 22–23, June 26–27, Jul 10–11 & 17-18, Aug 7-8 & 28-29, Sept. 11–12, Oct. 9–10, Nov. 13–14, Dec. 11–12.

Students explore the art of boatbuilding in this two-day hands-on course, beginning with lofting, and moving on to the setup, steam bending and different methods of creating the backbone of small boats. They also learn planking methods, both carvel and lapstrake, and use of appropriate fasteners.



After two days, students will have

the knowledge, skill, and confidence to choose a design and style of boat to build on their own. (12 hours).

Each boat will be completed to a watertight condition and ready to take home for paint or varnish. Teams are limited to a maximum of 4 persons, at least one of whom must be an adult. (6 hours).
